# **Sustaining Our Vital Support Systems**

Ichabod Crane CSD leaders and the Board of Education collaboratively developed a 2024-25 proposed budget that focuses on significant investments in mental health, academic and social-emotional supports. The proposed spending plan sustains these vital systems for our students and staff, previously funded by stimulus grant funding.

Over four years, the district used federal grants to explore ways to strengthen our academic and social-emotional support systems. Following thorough deliberation, five pivotal positions were added: literacy coach, school psychologist, High School AIS teacher, school counselor and K-12 school social worker.

As the federal grants end, the proposed budget maintains these five support positions with funds from the local budget. District and Board leaders prioritized these roles, while also maintaining current positions and programs, all while emphasizing prudent fiscal planning for the future.

These support systems are integral to our holistic approach to educating the whole child. Through this evidence-based method, we cultivate nurturing environments for our approximately 1,700 students to foster academic, social-emotional, mental health and wellness development.

"This proposed budget truly exemplifies the district's and the Board of Education's unwavering dedication to preserving the support structures essential for the success and well-being of our students and staff, both during their time at Ichabod Crane and as they transition beyond our district," Superintendent Marie Digirolamo said.

The literacy coach plays a key role in K-6 literacy instruction. The role involves coaching cycles, research, intervention, collaboration and coordination.

The four remaining positions offer necessary student counseling, addressing mental health and wellness needs, driven partly by the ongoing impact of COVID-19 and a revised student support approach focusing on academic and social-emotional needs.

· Our school psychologist performs formal



student evaluations, develops behavior intervention plans and supports teachers with research-based interventions.

- Our school counselor supports at-risk students in the Middle and High Schools, fostering organization, accountability and communication between home and school.
- Our full-time social worker serves as a link between students, families and external resources, like the county Mental Health Center and NYS Office of Children and Family Services
- Our High School academic intervention position offers essential support to students facing academic challenges.

"These roles serve as leaders in prioritizing academic success and social-emotional learning at ICCSD. Their work is crucial in maintaining our supportive, inclusive school community where both students and staff thrive," said Peg Warner, Director of Special Education, who oversees the Counseling and Psychology Departments.

# **Budget Proposal Upholds Focus on Literacy**

The 2024-25 budget proposal supports sustained efforts to improve literacy instruction across the district.

New programs, rooted in the Science of Reading, equip our youngest students with essential literacy skills necessary for comprehending complex texts, effective communication and critical thinking across subjects.

The proposed budget allocates funds for instructional materials and professional learning sessions for our core literacy programs: CKLA at the Primary School (grades K-3) and Benchmark Advance at the Middle School (grades 4-6). CKLA was implemented in 2022, followed by Benchmark in 2023.

Additionally, the 2024-25 budget maintains funding for the literacy coach position.

"Support from our literacy coach continues to be a central part of our shifts in literacy instruction," Assistant Superintendent Lucas Christensen said. "This role is one of the key factors contributing to the success we've seen so far in both CKLA and Benchmark. Going forward, we are excited to expand the scope of this position into other areas of teaching and learning at ICC."



Our Primary School teachers have effectively integrated CKLA into their classrooms, as evidenced by increases in student proficiency. They continue to utilize i-Ready, an online reading and math program for both instruction and assessment, which is also funded in the proposed budget.

"The literacy coach has encouraged teachers to expand their instructional methods and to experiment with new strategies," Primary School Principal Andrea Williams said. "Consistent with research and best practice, we have thoughtfully provided a wide range of support for teachers throughout the implementation, including professional learning, aligned materials, ongoing training and time to plan together."

In its first year, Benchmark continues to be explored by our teach-

ers as they delve into the materials, with administrators and staff noting positive outcomes thus far.

"Our students are tackling sophisticated vocabulary in ways that require them to do more than just learn definitions. This approach fosters a deep comprehension of language and more effective written expression," Middle School Co-Principal Tim Farley said.

# 360° View of our Pathways to Success

Leaders and staff at Ichabod Crane CSD understand the value of providing an array of pathways for our students to achieve academic, social and emotional success.

The budget proposal sustains this commitment by maintaining and expanding upon the positions and programs essential for our students to achieve a key measure of success – high school graduation.

Our district's strategic priorities, outlined in the Board of Education's **Rider Goals**, guide our efforts. Project 95 aims to maintain the High School's graduation rate at 95% or higher, a target consistently met since the Riders' Pathways to Success initiative started in 2019. **In fact, the state confirmed our graduation rate for the 2022-23 school year at 98%!** 

Moreover, our graduation rates among economicallydisadvantaged students and students with disabilities consistently surpass state, county and regional averages. In 2023, 91% of economically-disadvantaged students and 93% of students with disabilities graduated.

"Once again, our district leaders, including our administration, Board of Education, faculty and staff, came together to craft a budget for next year that puts our students first," Superintendent Marie Digirolamo said. "The drafted budget sustains essential positions and effective, long-standing systems, ensuring all of our students learn in nurturing and supportive environments. This fosters academic achievement and overall well-being, aligning with our approach to educating the whole child."

## **ARTS IN EDUCATION**

During this academic year, the district used Arts in Education funding to enhance students' educational experiences through partnerships with outside arts organizations. This included Flying Deer, our K-4 nature-based program, and workshops led by artist and educator Sasha Sicurella for our fifth graders at the Middle School. Additionally, the Traveling Lantern Theatre Group staged a captivating play about space travel at our Primary School. The proposed budget for the upcoming year maintains a strong emphasis on Arts in Education initiatives, underscoring our commitment to integrating the Arts into ICC in new and innovative ways.

The proposed spending plan maintains currenting staffing levels and programs, along with the five previously grantfunded positions: High School AIS teacher, literacy coach, school psychologist, school counselor and K-12 social worker.

High School Principal Craig Shull stressed the importance of the school's new AIS instructor. "This teacher identifies students needing extra support and provides a small-class setting for personalized instruction. As a result, students progress toward their academic and CTE goals, meeting graduation requirements and staying on track for timely graduation."

The proposed budget funds ongoing and new courses for student enrichment. At the High School, STEAM classes like Metals I and II continue, introducing welding and materials processing. Advanced Drafting Techniques, a new course, meets requests for expanded AutoCAD. Also, a new Spanish Heritage class delves into literature, film, culture and history.

Next year's proposed budget supports continued investment in technology, replacing another third of the Chromebook fleet, as well as professional learning opportunities for all departments.

"Ichabod Crane leaders have long recognized the strength of our school community lies in its interconnectedness and its people working together. It is truly an example of how collective impact exceeds individual contributions," Assistant Superintendent Lucas Christensen said. "Next year's budget proposal ensures the sustainability of the teams and systems crucial for ongoing student success in 2024-25."

## **RIDER GOALS 2027**

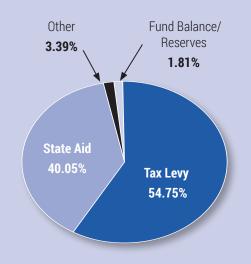
District leaders are shaping our next strategic plan, **Rider Goals 2027**, with support from the proposed budget. We value community input to create a roadmap grounded in research and data.

# **Collaborative Partnerships Foster Student Success**

Partnerships, both internal and external, provide opportunities for our students to explore their diverse interests within and beyond the ICCSD campus. These collaborations forge individualized pathways that equip them with the knowledge, skills and experiences for success at ICC and beyond.

The 2024-25 budget proposal supports the district's many impactful partnerships. External partnerships include CTE (Career and Technical Education) programs offered by Questar III and Capital Region BOCES spanning many topics, including aviation, health care, construction, cosmetology, criminal justice, culinary arts, education and visual and performing arts.

ICCSD Class of 2024 Salutatorian Grace Perito described her decision to apply and enroll in the New Visions' STEM program as highly rewarding. It has given her the opportunity to take college-level physics courses at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI).

"I applied for the program because I enjoyed taking math and science classes, but I didn't know what I wanted to do with that for my future career. The program has not only given me confidence in my major of chemical engineering, but it has made me feel prepared for my future studies in college." Grace said.

For these partnerships to remain effective and sustainable over time, coordination efforts require collaboration among staff from different departments, as well as outside community members and institutions.

High School teacher Heather Scarano said her students gain work-based learning opportunities through the district's special class, "Introduction to Employment." Each year, the students tour approximately 30 local businesses and intern at ICC schools and non-instructional departments.

"Our program owes much of its success to the partnerships within and beyond the district," Mrs. Scarano said. "Local businesses generously offer insights into their operations and what they seek in employees, providing invaluable real-world experiences that classroom instruction alone cannot replicate." Also, the district partners with Columbia-Greene Community College and other higher education institutions to provide collegiate-level courses to our students, such as Introduction to Automotive Repair in our STEAM Wing, Advanced Biology, Ceramics and Sculpture, Software Development, Spanish IV and V, Music Theory and Precalculus.

We are partners in the regional distance learning program, which allows us to share programs with other school districts and BOCES through distance-learning technologies.

Our internal Career Exploration Internship Program (CEIP), run by High School teacher Cori Drummond, connects students with adult mentors in various workplaces, in and out of the district. This includes students interning in Education, Psychology, Maintenance and IT within the district, and externally in the fields of Real Estate, Nursing, Insurance, Carpentry, Sports Management and Chiropractic.

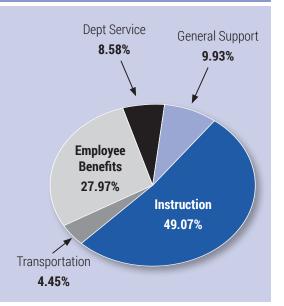
"This program allows our students to explore potential careers early on, empowering them to make informed decisions about their future educational and professional paths," Mrs. Drummond said. "We're immensely thankful for the individuals who've supported our students, providing real-life experiences in their areas of interest. These partnerships are instrumental in making this program a success."



**ICHABOD CARES:** *The ICCSD safety net program supports our students and families.* At the Primary and Middle Schools, staff coordinate the BackPack programs, distributing bags of food weekly. Ichabod's Table supplies food for High Schoolers, and Ichabod's Closet offers clothing, shoes and toiletries. 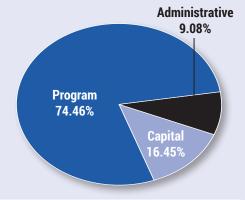

## **VOTER INFORMATION**

#### **VOTER ELIGIBILITY**

You are eligible to vote in the district's annual budget vote and Board of Education election if you are a U.S. citizen, at least 18 years old, and a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote.

### **VOTER REGISTRATION**

You must be registered before you are permitted to vote. You are already registered if you have:

- Voted in a district election, such as the budget vote and Board of Education election, within the last four (4) years.
- Voted in a general election as a district resident within the last four (4) years.

ICCSD district residents may register to vote with the District Clerk from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the district's Central Office. To vote in a district election, including the annual budget vote and Board of Education election, registration must be completed at least five days prior.

# ABSENTEE & EARLY MAIL VOTER BALLOTS

Any district resident who wishes to vote early, or who will be unable to vote in person, may request an absentee ballot or early mail voter ballot.

Applications for absentee/early mail ballots must be received by the District Clerk by May 14, 2024, if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter — or by May 20, 2024, if the ballot will be picked up at the district's Central Office. Completed absentee ballots and early mail voter ballots must be received by the District Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on May 21, 2024.
